research based on his theory that cancers cannot grow or spread without a blood supply to feed them - a process known as angiogenesis.

In recent years, he and his colleagues, in conjunction with a Maryland biotechnology company, have been developing and are now testing antiangiogenesis drugs. The first two human clinical trials for one such drug, Angiostatin, are under way at Jefferson. Researchers hope that anti-angiogenesis drugs eventually will halt cancer growth in patients.

'We Need You,' Sonny Hill Tells Hospital's Trauma Staff

Drawing on his own life experiences and the success of youth programs he created and has led for years. Sonny Hill, long a Philadelphia sports legend and youth mentor, held a noontime gathering of Jeffersonians in rapt attention at a recent brownbag presentation.

Energetic, charismatic and at times playful, Mr. Hill wove humor, sobering reality and stark social perceptions through his extemporaneous remarks.

The second speaker in Thomas Jefferson University Hospital's Violence Prevention Program offered numerous insights and several "back-to-basics" solutions to the growing issue of youth violence.

Calling violence - at all ages - the major social issue today, Mr. Hill praised the work of the hospital's Emergency Trauma Center.

"We applaud you for being on the front line. You must deal with the effects of violence after the fact.

'We need you - because without you, where would we be? You are saving lives, so please continue what you're doing.'

The upsurge in youth violence has grown so severe, hospital emergency departments are stretched thin, especially on weekends. And Mr. Hill fears the problem will grow worse, citing "street" forecasts of increased gang activity.

"These are not gangs like the kind I negotiated with when I was young. If they knew you were on your way

to play ball, they'd respect that and let you pass. These are a different kind of gang - they do not play fair."

'Simple But Hard' Solutions

To solve social ills, Mr. Hill calls for a "simple, but hard" return to structure and basics. "Simple" because it stresses basic values saying things like "Thank you, please, Mr., Ms., Mrs., thanks for doing that." "Hard," he implies, because it requires repetition, patience, "people commitment" by many people, and time - lots of time.

The key is setting good examples for youth to follow. But it requires commitment for the long term."

Mr. Hill believes violence - at all ages - is the worst of a list of unresolved social ills harming American society since World War II. He lists, chronologically, education,

alcoholism, drugs and AIDS, saying

that all could have been solved had society dealt with each early and head-on instead of denying their reality and impact. Now, violence is the most serious of all.

Still, Mr. Hill remains upbeat and optimistic: "Solutions are actually easy. We make them seem hard by our denial."

About the Speaker And the Program

Currently Sonny Hill serves as executive advisor to the President/CEO of the First Union Complex and to the President of the Philadelphia 76ers, Pat Croce. He is perhaps best known to thousands of Philadelphia youth for creating and running several summer basketball leagues for more than 20 years.

Aimed at curbing and preventing violence in the city, the hospital's Violence Prevention Program is sponsored by the Violence Prevention Partnership and funded by the William Penn Foundation through the hospital's Department of Pastoral Care and Department of Emergency Medicine, whose Director, Theodore A. Christopher, MD, Associate Professor of Surgery (Emergency Medicine), introduced Mr. Hill.

The William Penn Foundation recently awarded a new, threeyear grant totaling \$746,946 to the hospital's Violence Prevention Program.

ABC News in New York. Dr. Johnson identified the 1950s as the decade in which the current relationship between medicine and media began to take shape, citing as an example President Dwight D. Eisenhower's voluntary communication with the press in 1955 about his heart attack. The relationship became more extensive in the 1960s and '70s in response to an idealized image of physicians and hospitals presented by television programs like "Marcus Welby, MD"

> and to media surveys indicating that medical stories could boost publications' circulation and television news ratings.

Noting that this has led to increased competition between and within media and medicine, Dr. Johnson advised, "People have to work at finding sources they can trust, and be skeptical of those they can't. On balance, the public is better off today than it was 30 years ago because of all of the information it has access to. Whether that will be the case 30 years from now, I can't say."
