

Jefferson Celebrates the 25th Anniversary of First Liver Transplant in Region

On May 31, 1984, the Delaware Valley's first-ever liver transplant was performed at Thomas Jefferson University Hospital. Twenty-five years later, Michael Donahue, the recipient of that transplant remains healthy and active, as does Jefferson's Liver Transplantation Program.

Today, Jefferson's program is not only the longest continuously active liver transplantation program in the area but also one of the fastest growing, having performed transplants in more than half the patients on our waiting list in the last three years. TJUH has developed innovative therapies to improve the quality of life for our liver transplant patients, including new anti-rejection protocols. Recently, we completed a study determining that steroids are not primarily responsible for recurrent hepatitis C incidence after transplantation. Currently, we are testing immunosuppressive drugs to prolong patient and graft survival even further without significant side effects.

In addition, Jefferson uses a bloodless technique for performing major liver resection that was co-developed by Jefferson surgeon Cataldo Doria, MD, PhD, and former colleagues at the University of Pittsburgh Medical Center - Italy. This technique is of great benefit to our patients, as blood transfusion is linked to increases in length of hospital stay, infection and death rate.

Acute Stroke Center Receives Gold Award

The Jefferson Hospital for Neuroscience's Stroke Center has won another high honor for its continuing commitment to patients. The American Stroke Association/American Heart Association have cited the Center for its excellence, granting it the Gold Award.

The criteria for the award is a score of over 90 percent in 14 areas, which the American Heart Association considers a marker for stroke center excellence. Carissa Pineda, MD, an attending physician at the Stroke Center, accepted

the award this spring on behalf of Jefferson in a ceremony in Delaware. According to the American Stroke Association, each year approximately 700,000 people suffer a stroke – 500,000 are first attacks and 200,000 are recurrent. Of stroke survivors, 21 percent of men and 24 percent of women

recurrent. Of stroke survivors, 21 percent of men and 24 percent of women die within a year, and for those aged 65 and older, the percentage is even higher. Jefferson Hospital for Neuroscience's Stroke Center has been recognized as a place for the "Best Care in Philadelphia" and as "one of the most advanced

a place for the Best Care in Philadelphia and as one of the most advanced centers in the United States for stroke prevention, diagnosis, treatment and research" by *Philadelphia* magazine. The Stroke Center's approach to care is multidisciplinary, incorporating the expertise of Thomas Jefferson University Hospitals' extensive medical staff of leading specialists.



In June, a portrait of Vijay M. Rao, MD, was presented to the University. Dr. Rao is Professor and Chair of the Department of Radiology. She has been a member of the Jefferson faculty since completing her radiology residency here in 1978. When appointed Chair of the Department in 2002, she was the first woman to chair a clinical department in Jefferson's history.

Komen for the Cure Grants KCC \$6.7 Million for Breast Cancer Research

Researchers from Jefferson's Kimmel Cancer Center have been awarded a Susan G. Komen for the Cure Promise Grant of almost \$6.7 million for five years for continued breast cancer research.

The project represents a multidisciplinary team of scientists from a consortium that also includes Walter Reed Army Medical Center and DecisionQ in Washington, D.C., as well as the Windber Research Institute and Mdr Systems Inc. in Windber, Pa.

The principal investigator, Hallgeir Rui, MD, PhD, is a professor of Cancer Biology and Medical Oncology at Jefferson Medical College. The coprincipal investigator and leader of the clinical investigations associated with the project is Edith Mitchell, MD,

a medical oncologist and clinical professor of Medicine and Medical Oncology at Jefferson and Associate Director of Diversity Programs for Jefferson's Kimmel Cancer Center.

The team will use the funds to investigate methods to optimize selection of patients for breast cancer treatment. There are two parts to the translational research: laboratory and clinical.

In the laboratory, Dr. Rui and colleagues will analyze tumor biomarkers that could possibly be used to stratify patients and tailor the best therapy to the individual patient. "There are many subtypes of breast cancer, and we want to identify protein biomarker patterns that can be used to make sure patients are offered the most appropriate therapy," said Dr. Rui.

On the clinical side, Dr. Mitchell is leading a clinical trial of a new drug called motesanib. "Triple-negative breast cancer, which

has an increased frequency in African-American women, is a difficult cancer to treat," Dr. Mitchell said. "It often lacks response to many commonly used treatments; therefore, there is a great need to identify more effective therapies for this patient population."

Understanding molecular pathways may enhance opportunities to develop personalized approaches to the treatment of breast cancer. This is particularly important, since approximately 40,000 patients a year die from the disease in the United States alone.

This spring, Jefferson announced its first winner of the annual *Miles Mack Community Service Award*. Bernard Downing of the Information Systems Department accepted the award at Jefferson's annual volunteer luncheon.

Named for our longtime colleague who was passionate about serving others and helping his community by creating the Xtra-Miles Developmental Basketball League, the *Miles Mack Community Service Award* was developed to recognize a Jefferson employee who consistently demonstrates community leadership and social responsibility. In addition, the individual chosen as the award winner must serve as a role model to others by exhibiting the exceptional character and commitment to service that Miles displayed every day.

"Every Thursday, Bernard tutors elementary school children in his community," noted Aron Berman, Manager, Patient Transportation and colleague of Miles Mack. NIH Stimulus Grant Awarded to Jefferson for Pancreatic Cancer Research

The U.S. government has recognized the importance of pancreatic research at Thomas Jefferson University by awarding a National Institutes of Health (NIH) grant to Arthur M. Buchberg, PhD. Dr. Buchberg, who is Associate Professor in the Department of Microbiology and Immunology at TJU, will receive nearly \$204,000 for his project, entitled: "Sensitized screen to identify cooperating genes involved in pancreatic cancer." Jefferson was one of 10 institutions in Pennsylvania to receive the recently awarded stimulus grants.

Dr. Buchberg's project will involve developing screening methods to detect novel oncogenes and tumorsuppressor genes associated with pancreatic cancer to identify new biomarkers and molecular pathways as therapeutic targets.

With the American Recovery and Reinvestment Act of 2009 (ARRA),

signed into law on February 17, various sectors of the American economy have been granted funding. According to the NIH website, the nation's medical research agency has received an unprecedented level of funding (\$8.2 billion in extramural funding) in order to help stimulate the U.S. economy through the support and advancement of scientific research.

ACHIEVEMENTS

Researchers of Jefferson Kimmel Cancer Center found a new universal breast cancer marker that predicts recurrence and clinical outcome. The marker appears to be widely applicable to all breast cancer patients, regardless of other established prognostic indicators.

ACHIEVEMENTS

JeffSTAT received the three-year full re-accreditation from the Commission on Accreditation of Medical Transport systems. The re-accreditation is based on Jefferson's documentation, a site survey in January and a review by the Board of Directors of Jefferson's program, quality, service, education and safety.

An herb recently found to kill pancreatic cancer cells also appears to inhibit development of pancreatic cancer as a result of its anti-inflammatory properties, according to researchers from the Kimmel Cancer Center at Jefferson.

AARP published a story in its May/June issue ("The Right Hospital for You") that included a link to "Top Hospitals in Major Metropolitan Areas," a list compiled by nonprofit consumer information and service resource, Consumers' Checkbook. Jefferson is listed as one of only three top hospitals in the Delaware Valley.

Research by Jefferson's Kimmel Cancer Center found that the effects of imatinib may be enhanced when given along with chloroquine, a drug that inhibits autophagy, a cell process that helps leukemia cells evade cell death.

Project ABLE, conducted by Jefferson Center for Applied Research on Aging and Health (CARAH) found that occupational therapy and physical therapy intervention can extend the length and quality of life for older adults by up to 3.5 years.

According to researchers from the Kimmel Cancer Center at Jefferson, hypofractionated stereotactic radiotherapy was well-tolerated and improved symptoms in patients at Jefferson who had recurrent low-grade glioma.

A combination of sorafenib and vitamin K had an effect in vitro on both human pancreas cancer and hepatocellular carcinoma, according to researchers from the Kimmel Cancer Center at Jefferson.

Scientists at Jefferson Medical College have received a five-year, \$1.7 million National Institutes of Health grant funded by the National Institute of Arthritis and Musculoskeletal and Skin Diseases to study mechanisms regulating stem cell self-renewal and differentiation, with the aim of regenerating diseased and painful intervertebral discs.

Thomas Jefferson University researchers have found that a protein related to aggressive cancers can actually improve the efficacy of the drug, gemcitabine, at treating pancreatic cancer. The researchers published their finding in a Priority Report in *Cancer Research*.

The Department of Pathology, Anatomy and Cell Biology has signed an agreement with Roche to become a Roche Molecular Center of Excellence, which affords new opportunities for translational research and clinical trials at Jefferson. Stephen Peiper, MD, Chair, Department of Pathology, Anatomy and Cell Biology will serve as the Director of the Roche Molecular Center of Excellence at Jefferson. Donald Jungkind, MD, Director of the Clinical Microbiology Lab at Jefferson and Zoe Wang, PhD, Assistant Director of the Lab, will serve as co-directors.

The Marketing Department of Jefferson won several awards in the Annual Healthcare Awards national competition. Winning entries included the MAGNET* video, Nursing annual report and advertising campaigns.

The International Interprofessional Education Conference in Halifax, Nova Scotia will feature Thomas Jefferson University staff members who will present eight sessions at *Collaborating Across Borders II: Building Bridges Between Interprofessional Education and Practice.*
