Students must complete all undergraduate major and college studies credits, earn overall 3.0 or higher GPA in undergraduate coursework, complete all Counseling Program prerequisite courses with a minimum 3.0 GPA, and all Counseling Program admission steps prior to matriculating into the graduate Counseling courses. Formal review of student's academic progress will occur at the end of the second and third years of undergraduate coursework. Students who do not meet Counseling Program academic standards will complete the B.S. in Psychology by completing the additional courses for the major, by advisement. The bachelor's degree requires a minimum of 121 credits.
