## Herbert Kean, MD, Endows Chair in Otolaryngology

Herbert Kean, MD, OTO, PFS '60, Clinical Professor of Otolaryngology, has made a commitment to Jefferson Medical College (JMC) to establish an endowed chair in the Department of Otolaryngology-Head and Neck Surgery. The new chair, to be known as The Herbert Kean, MD, Chair in Otolaryngology, will support the activities of the Chairman of the Department.

Recently retired, Dr. Kean's association with Jefferson is now in its fifth decade. After completing his postgraduate training in Otolaryngology and Plastic Facial Surgery at JMC in 1960, he returned to become a member of the faculty in 1969. He performed the first outpatient procedure at the Jefferson Surgical Center in 1986, as well as the 50,000th outpatient procedure in 1998.

## 'Keep In Touch' Email Messages Bring **Hospital to Community**

Thanks to the Internet and email technology, a new community service of Thomas Jefferson University Hospital permits community members and the hospital to stay in direct contact through a series of electronic newsletters and messages tailored to each person's health interests or needs.

The service is called, appropriately enough, "Keep In Touch." It works like this:


Consumers sign up for the program at the hospital's Web site, www.JeffersonHospital.org When people sign up, they request and receive information pertinent only to the health and wellness topics, and geographic locations in the Delaware Valley, which they specify.

They then receive emailed

information in the form of quarterly newsletters - devoted to such topics as cancer care, heart care and orthopedics - as well as brief, periodic, personalized email messages alerting or reminding recipients of screenings, programs and other beneficial events sponsored by Thomas Jefferson University Hospital.

By mid-March, 1,100 subscribers had signed up throughout the Delaware Valley.

Thomas Jefferson University Hospital has launched a program designed to reduce noise

throughout hospital facilities so that patients and employees alike may benefit from a quieter

environment. Information has been distributed to employees in

conjunction with "First Annual Noise Out Day" displays April 3 in both The Atrium and Gibbon Building lobbies and the Jefferson Hospital for Neuroscience lobby.

Brochures and display pieces explain that noise makes it difficult for our patients to rest and for employees to concentrate. In fact, noise can seriously impact our health by causing sleep disruption, increased stress, high blood pressure and fatigue.

### Tips to Reduce Noise

- · Consciously lower your voice and others will follow.
- · Put your beeper on vibrate mode. · Answer phones within three rings
- or sooner, especially at night. Think of ways to keep noise as
- far away from patients as possible, such as moving loud phones away from rooms.
- · Laughter is healthy, but it's loud, too. Take it to a place away from patients.
- · Avoid shouting in the halls unless it is absolutely necessary.
- · Wear soft-soled shoes on patient floors.
- Report noisy equipment.
- · Respond quickly to alarm and call bells.
- · Close doors when appropriate.
- When you work at night, be aware that your "daytime" is the patient's time to sleep. Think creatively!

Park, and an MD in 1981 from Louisiana State University School of Medicine, Shreveport.

**Outstanding Cardiology Background** Dr. Feldman was an intern, resident and cardiology fellow at the Johns Hopkins Hospital in Baltimore. At Hopkins, he rose to become Director of the Heart Failure Research Program in the Division of Cardiology and Director of the Belfer Laboratory for Molecular Biology of Heart Failure at the Johns Hopkins University School of Medicine.

He joined the UPMC Health System in 1994.

Dr. Feldman has a longstanding interest in both the molecular and clinical aspects of congestive heart failure (CHF). At the molecular level, he has been attempting to identify genes that serve as markers for CHF, while at the clinical level,

he has studied the use of genetically engineered proteins to treat the disease. Among many advances in his research, he has generated transgenic mice that overexpress TNF and develop congestive heart failure.

Dr. Feldman is currently principal investigator for grants from the National Institutes of Health which support these interests, and he chairs or co-chairs steering committees of three clinical trials.

Many Leadership Roles and Honors Dr. Feldman is a fellow of the American Heart Association (AHA) and of the American College of Cardiology. He is President of the Association of Professors of Cardiology for 2002-2003, Immediate Past President of the Heart Failure Society of America and a Councilor of the Association of University Cardiologists.

He serves on numerous American College of Cardiology and AHA

committees and Co-Chairs the AHA Task Force on Translational Medicine and Functional Genomics.

Dr. Feldman has received numerous honors and awards, including election to the Association of American Physicians, selection as one of the Best Doctors in America, and recipient of the Rolex Achievement Award.

He currently serves on the editorial board of the Journal of the American College of Cardiology, Journal of Molecular and Cellular Cardiology, Heart Failure Review, Journal of Cardiovascular Pharmacology and Therapeutics, Journal of Cardiac Failure and Heart Failure. He is senior editor of Congestive Heart Failure.

Dr. Feldman is the author of numerous articles in professional journals and book chapters on topics related to heart failure and other cardiologic topics.

He also serves on the Board of Trustees of Gettysburg College.

### **University Modernizing Student Campus Housing**

Thomas Jefferson University is undertaking a major project to modernize student housing facilities on campus, Paul C. Brucker, MD, University President has announced.

The project calls for the thorough modernization of the Barringer and Orlowitz residence buildings beginning this summer and taking two years to complete. Some work on fire and sprinkler systems will begin immediately.

The project will include:

- updating finishes and building systems
- installing modern kitchens

- providing wireless network and internet access capability
- · upgrading the fire alarm and installing a sprinkler system In a letter to students. Dr. Brucker assured that "We will do everything possible to minimize inconvenience to our student-housing residents while the modernization project is under way."

The project results from negotiating a long-term lease agreement for the two buildings with Lubert Adler Associates.

The agreement also includes provision for redevelopment of the . Victory Building at 10th and

Chestnut Streets. Slated for completion in January 2003, development of the west wing of the Victory Building will result in 50 additional apartments for Jefferson student housing. The University is considering other possible uses for the Victory Building's east wing.

Lubert Adler's partner, Philadelphia Management Corp. (PMC) will manage construction and renovation activities.

# Thousands View Live Coronary Brachytherapy Webcast

The March 5 live Webcast of coronary brachytherapy for restenosis from Thomas Jefferson University Hospital's Cardiac Catheterization Laboratory drew numbers of viewers far surpassing expectations.

According to figures released by our broadcast vendor, slp3D, the live Webcast drew 7,384 viewer sessions, a significant increase over our initial Webcast in October.

Most viewer sessions were from Pennsylvania - 2,875. Other strong regions were Virginia, New Jersey, New York and California, with more than 40 viewer sessions from outside the United States.

In addition to the Jefferson Hospital Website, several other healthcare sites carried the broadcast. Media coverage and promotion on media sites

significantly boosted the number of viewer sessions that came through Jefferson's site.

During the broadcast, Jefferson Hospital received 125 email questions submitted by the viewing audience, several of which were answered by the narrator during the broadcast. JEFF NOW also received a number of phone calls and made several referrals to cardiologists.

Coronary brachytherapy is the latest procedure used to prevent restenosis, or reblocking, of coronary arteries. Restenosis often occurs over time in patients who have previously undergone coronary stenting.

Performing the procedure were Jefferson Hospital interventional

cardiologist David L. Fischman, MD, Associate Professor of Medicine, Jefferson Medical

College (JMC) and radiation oncologist Richard K. Valicenti, MD, Associate Professor of Radiation Oncology, JMC.

Interventional cardiologist Michael P. Savage, MD, Associate Professor of Medicine, JMC, narrated.

"Clearly this was a very successful event," says Carmhiel J. Brown, the hospital's Senior Vice President for Marketing, Public Relations and Communications.

Dr. Rupnick is now a researcher and instructor at Brigham & Women's Hospital in Boston and at Harvard Medical School.

Describing the potential of her laboratory experiments at M.I.T. and the Children's Hospital in Boston, The Times wrote: "Dr. Rupnick has shown that an entire class of compounds designed to inhibit cancer may also, without any obvious side effects, cause extraordinary weight loss.'
