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### **Renato Baserga, MD, Named Interim Director Of Jefferson's Kimmel Cancer Center**

Renato Baserga, MD, has been named Interim Director of the Kimmel Cancer Center of Thomas Jefferson University and Thomas Jefferson University Hospital, effective September 30, Thomas J. Nasca, MD, FACP, Dean, Jefferson Medical College (JMC), and Senior Vice President, Thomas Jefferson University, has announced.

Dr. Baserga is the Distinguished Professor of Microbiology and Immunology, JMC, and the Deputy Director of the Kimmel Cancer Center at lefferson.

Dr. Baserga is an internationally recognized leader in research in basic mechanisms of cancer cell biology. He has most recently concentrated his research efforts in the understanding of the role of the Type 1 Insulin-Like Growth Factor and its signaling pathway. Results of these efforts have led to novel therapeutic approaches targeting this system for anticancer agents.

Dr. Nasca made the announcement of "this important leadership role" to the University Board of Trustees and the wider Jefferson community "with great enthusiasm and pleasure."

### Scott D. Goldstein, MD, Named **Director, Colon and Rectal Surgery**



Colorectal surgeon Scott D. Goldstein, MD, has been named Director of Colon and Rectal Surgery, Department of Surgery, Thomas Jefferson University Hospital.

Dr. Goldstein, who is also Assistant Professor of Surgery, Jefferson Medical College, has been at Jefferson for a decade. He had previously served as Director of Colon and Rectal Surgery at Pennsylvania Hospital.

Dr. Goldstein's research interests include colorectal cancer, endoscopic gastrointestinal surgery and inflammatory bowel disease.

The board-certified colorectal surgeon is a fellow of the American College of Surgeons and a member of the American Society of Colon and Rectal Surgeons, the Society of American Gastrointestinal Endoscopic Surgeons and the Pennsylvania Society of Colon and Rectal Surgeons, for which he has served as President.

Dr. Goldstein has been listed in "The Best Doctors in America" since 1998. He is the author of numerous publications, chapters and editorial reviews.

Dr. Goldstein completed a residency in colon and rectal surgery at the University of Medicine and Dentistry of New Jersey-Rutgers Medical School and a surgical residency at Lenox Hill Hospital in New York City. He earned a BS in biology in 1973 from the University of Pittsburgh, and his MD from the State University of New York at Buffalo.

# Robert W. Frederick, MD Named Team Physician by U.S. Olympic Committee

The United States Olympic Committee named sports medicine specialist Robert W. Frederick, MD, of the Rothman Institute at Thomas Jefferson University Hospital as volunteer head physician for the United States men's and women's artistic and woman's rhythmic gymnastics teams competing in the 2004 Olympic Games in Athens.

Dr. Frederick, Assistant Professor of Orthopaedic Surgery, Jefferson Medical College, was one of only eight physicians in the United States, and the only one from Pennsylvania, selected to provide medical care to about 540 American athletes taking part in the games in August.

"This is a once-in-a-lifetime opportunity," Dr. Frederick says. "These athletes have dedicated the last four years of their lives towards the goal of competing in Greece and bringing home the gold. Our goal as their physicians is to minimize the impact of any injury or illness on their achieving Dr. Frederick also provided medical services to the acrobatic and trampoline athletes, as well as to some of the smaller U.S. sports which did not have a physician dedicated to their participants. During the 1996

Summer Olympic Games in Atlanta, Dr. Frederick served as director of athlete care

for gymnastics and cared for gymnasts including Kerry Strug, who won a gold medal for herself and her team, despite a severe ankle injury.

Dr. Frederick also is Assistant Team Physician to the Philadelphia Phillies, the Philadelphia Soul Arena football team and St. Joseph's University. In addition, he helps provide medical coverage for many of the elite track and field events and distance runs in Philadelphia.

"We anticipate no shortage of vaccine this year," says Dr. O'Connor. The timetable calls for shots to be available from October through January. Flu season generally begins in December, and peaks in January and February.

For the first time, it is planned to give flu shots at the Benefits Fair on October 26. Meanwhile, employees should watch for printed flyers with paychecks and for broadcast emails. The Health Services Office will announce some special hours to accommodate weekend and night workers.

The goal is to protect both self and others. "Last year we had eight patients in the hospital with flu. By getting vaccinated, an employee protects both self and family, as well as co-workers and other patients," says Dr. O'Connor.
